

Our squadron is facing the same challenge experienced by USPS in general: declining membership, and an aging membership. We haven't been able to attract enough new members to keep the organization vibrant. The main source of new members has traditionally been from students taking the Public Boating class – known as ABC, America's Boating Class.

One problem is that we just haven't gotten the word out to enough people, so attendance at the classes has been very low. The executive committee has recognized this as the problem we need to fix most, and will be working hard throughout the year to publicize our classes and events in whatever way we can. You may have seen the article in the Sun Journal a few weeks ago, describing the seminars we offer, along with the schedule. We plan to do a lot more in the way of publicity and advertising. We're also going to hold the classes in a more central location, which will hopefully make it easier for people to attend.

It's not all bad news, though. Over the past year we've had several cruises, including the small boat Cape Lookout cruise, a cruise up the Trent River, and a joint cruise with the Raleigh Squadron to South River.

We've contributed to our community through offering the ABC course to promote safe boating, the Cooperative charting program, to help NOAA keep local charts correct, and the Vessel Safety Check program. Many of our members volunteered at the MS Bike-a-thon in September, and the Chili cookoff in October raised \$300 for the NB High School Jr. ROTC sailing program.

Please be ready to help out with the D/27 Rendezvous, to be held in Oriental on June 20-22. P/D/C Mike McCulley and P/C Richard Tobacco have agreed to be co-chairmen for the D/27 Rendezvous planning committee and will be calling on all members to help. Plan to be there with your boat to enjoy all the facilities at Pecan Grove marina.

Both the District 27 Change of Watch and the CLSPS Change of Watch will be in New Bern this year. Use the registration forms in this issue. I hope to see you all there.

Boating Safety on Winter Waters Randy Troutman, United Marine Underwriters

Even the coldest weather of the year can't keep some diehard boaters from taking to the water during the winter months. If you're one of them, you need to be extra careful, as decreased air and water temperatures present special dangers. Here are some tips to help keep you safe and warm if you brave the winter waves.

Be sure to let family members and friends know where you're going and when you expect to be back. You should do this no matter what time of year it is, but it's especially important in the winter when less people will be on the water to help in case of an emergency.

Wear manmade fabrics like polyester rather than cotton. Cotton gets wet and stays wet, losing its insulating ability and actually causing chill. Polyester wicks moisture away from the skin, keeping you drier and warmer. The same is true for under layers as well as outer layers.

Don't just take a life jacket — wear it. Falls overboard happen, and more than half of all boating fatalities due to drowning occur because of the effects of being immersed in cold water. Thick clothes worn for protection against cold air temperatures can become heavy in water and make it difficult for those wearing them to stay afloat.

Consider wearing a neoprene wetsuit or floatcoat. These can dramatically increase your chances of survival if you unexpectedly end up in the drink. Plus, they add insulation and warmth without being too bulky.

Know how to survive in cold water. If you do fall in, get out quickly. If you can't get out, conserve your body heat by holding your knees to your chest and clasping your arms around your legs. This will protect your core. Do not remove your clothes and cover your head. Call for help but don't flail your arms, as this will tire you out and cause your body to lose heat faster.

Plan for "what if." Trust us, you'll be happy you brought back-up warmth if the worst happens. Pack a change of clothes, thick towels or blankets, a thermos filled with a hot beverage or soup, pocket warmers and other forms of heat that can quickly heat your body. It could mean the difference between a survival story and a tragic tale.

Thank you for allowing me to serve as Secretary to the Squadron this past year. Although I have been a member of the Power Squadron since 1988, this is the first Bridge office I've held. My background as an Office Manager for thirteen years before retirement helped me decide that I could be of help to the Squadron.

During this year, I have attended every Excom meeting and dinner meeting and recorded the minutes at each. I am grateful that Assistant Secretary Jim Reynolds was available if I was unable to attend a meeting.

I have attended and participated in the Operations Training Course, D27 Change of Watch in March, and the joint rendezvous at Cape Charles in August and attended the Fall Council and Conference in Greenville and Training Session in January in Raleigh attending the Secretary breakout sessions at both. 
Our sincere thanks to P/C Richard Tobacco for maintaining our Website.


