Carolyn and I split the weekend of March 21st & 22nd attending part of the District 27 Conference in Raleigh and visiting our son and his family in Wilmington for a pig roasting they hosted in their backyard on Saturday afternoon. The District Conference began with a fun "Tailgate" Party on Friday evening at a nearby restaurant, where we had wine and hors d'oeuvres on the porch and front lawn of the restaurant and dinner inside. Following are a few topics covered at the Conference on Saturday morning:

1. Advertising our classes, especially the ABC Course, on the Internet is the key to recruiting students. Advertising through TV and newspapers is also effective.
2. To make name tags more cost effective, it was suggested that unit officers begin using name tags that have just their name and squadron. I can relate to that. I must have at least 10 name tags that are unusable because they have a past office or rank on them. Also, use the USPS logo and, if space is available, the squadron burgee image as Cape Lookout SPS currently does. The emphasis appears to be giving the USPS logo more public exposure.
3. It was suggested that squadrons consider giving Honorary Membership to speakers for 6 months or a year. Local colleges are a good resource for teachers as well as speakers.

A question was raised about whether USPS squadrons should belong to local civic organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce. It was also suggested that units consider having a Facebook page to get more publicity. One caution is that if a squadron does have a Facebook page, images of anyone under the age of 18 should not be posted.

Instructors Needed




What distinguishes the United States Power Squadrons from other organizations is, in part, the excellent boating education we provide. Recall, education is

one of the three sides of our 'triangle', making it a very important part of our charter. Having taken USPS courses here and in Raleigh, I know that new-member recruitment depends to a great extent on the quality of class instruction.

We need to expand and strengthen our cadre of instructors. Teachers, like students, have obligations that prevent them from always being available. Often this makes it difficult to schedule a course over consecutive weeks. Volunteer as an instructor to initially back-up and fill-in when conflicts arise. You will find teaching rewarding – I do.

Cape Lookout offers three types of courses, 'core' boating instruction, electives, and seminars. Core courses, ABC3 – celestial navigation, require instructors to take Instructor Development, but electives and seminars do not. Teaching assistants to help students grasp presented materials are also needed. Contact rtobacco@suddenlink.net and we will work out how you can best assist our current instructors.

Currently there is a Seamanship class being taught by Kurt Weinheimer – four students are enrolled. America's Boating Course³ is scheduled to be held at Garber Methodist Church, beginning April 22. If you know a new boater who could benefit from this introductory course, please encourage them to take it. Classrooms are large, come with them and get involved in teaching.



Instead of a sign that says "Do Not Disturb", I need one that says "Already Disturbed, Proceed with Caution".



Denim Shirts: Denim cloth shirts come in both short and long sleeves.

They are priced at \$25.00. Sizes--same as above.
