#### **Piloting Course Starts This Month!**

We're lucky to be in a great place for boating—our creeks, rivers, and sounds provide endless possibilities. But the water can be shallow, shoals can block obvious routes, and submerged pilings sometimes threaten. Some of our more popular destinations—South River, Ocracoke, and River Dunes Marina, for instance—have twisting, tricky entrances. We need the skills reach our destinations safely and efficiently. That's what Piloting is all about.

In the Piloting course, you'll learn how to use your GPS, charts, compass, depth sounder, and common sense to safely navigate your boat throughout our area. You'll learn how to plan a safe route and follow it on the water, monitoring your position. You'll learn how to read a chart with much more precision.

Your instructor for Piloting is Bud Ellis. Bud has been an active member of USPS since 1980, and is the long-time CLSPS instructor for this course. He's a very experienced sailor, both inshore and offshore. He recently retired as the Dock Master at Northwest Creek Marina. Bud and his wife, Bev, spent last winter on their boat in Florida, with a round trip on the ICW. You will learn Piloting, but also a lot about boating in general, from Bud.

The course will start the week of July 25. Course sessions will be held in Fairfield Harbor, location and times TBD based on student needs. Tuition for the course is \$58, which includes the student manual, a plotting and labeling guide, and OpenCDN navigation software. You'll also need a compass and plotter—we have them available for a nominal charge if you don't have your own already. There are no prerequisites for this course.
