

Cruise to River Dunes -Blessing of the Fleet

Our squadron has planned an exciting cruise to River Dunes Marina on May 19. If you haven't been to River Dunes before, you'll find it to be one of the most beautiful marinas in our area.

We've planned this to be flexible to accommodate everyone. It's about 30 nm from the Neuse River Bridge in New Bern, and about 30 (statute) miles by car. You can plan to arrive by boat on Friday or Saturday, or if driving, you might want to come on Saturday.

The marina has a nice pool; I'm told it usually opens by Memorial Day, but the dock master thinks it likely will be open before then. There are showers, laundry, a lounge, picnic area with grills, and a nice restaurant.

If you arrive on Friday, plan to bring your own fare for dinner and perhaps we'll get together with the other boaters at the picnic area.

On Saturday, we'll have a picnic for lunch, CLSPS will bring hot dogs & hamburgers; bring your own drinks (we'll have water). After lunch on Saturday there will be a Blessing of the Fleet ceremony for our vessels in their docks.

Saturday night we'll enjoy dinner at the River Dunes' award winning restaurant.



Vessel Safety Examiners, Test Your Mustang Life Jacket

We are always told as a Vessel Examiner to wear our life jackets to project the idea of safety to the boating public. I am sure that most VEs have done so over the past 8 years that we have had them.

Now as we head into the boating season and all of the associated activities, I would suggest that the first thing a VE should do is examine and test his/her Mustang Inflatable life jacket. This operation is suggested to be performed every 2 to 3 months. I bet you have not even done it once in the 8 years you have had the jackets. I am suggesting this exercise because we have found a few jackets that won't hold air. If one of these are found I suggest that it be destroyed and disposed of because the total life expectancy is only 10 years.

So how do we test our jacket? Open it up along the Velcro seams as shown in Figure 1 until it looks like figure 2. Then remove the cap on the oral inflation tube (shown in figure 2) and inflate the Life Jacket orally.





Then keep the jacket inflated over night. If it fails to hold air all night it is defective. If it holds air ok, then reverse the oral inflation cap and compress the jacket to remove all of the air. Once deflated, replace the cap to its original position and fold the sides back and press the Velcro seams to hold the jacket together.

Now if you happen to really need the jacket while doing a VSC (Heaven forbid you fall into the water) the life jacket would be known to be useable.

EXCITING ADVENTURES P/C WILLIAM J. ASH SN, H

At my station in life I tend to look back on wonderful times with adventures I thought would never have happened. How could they? I was just a little fellow in a big world. It was impossible for me to plan teaching thirty undergraduate students on a New England coasting schooner; actually showing them how to steer her with the sails balanced tacking upwind and running before. They loved dead reckoning. Never in ten thousand years would I experience this. But, I did. Funny, things just happened to work out. Amazing!

I look back to see me standing at the helm of the iconic *S.S. United States* headed west in the North Atlantic, one day out of New York. There was I, invited by the Executive Officer, to participate in a tour of the bridge. Only four passengers were there. At the time I held the grade of Advanced Pilot. One of the others was a commander in the German navy. Afterwards I stood on the port bridge-wing with the Exec while moving 30+ knots into a head wind of 30+ knots. Pretty much of a breeze, eh? I marveled his ability to keep his spotless officer's hat on top of his head. Never again would I experience this. But, I was a member of U.S.P.S., someone who could talk the language of the sea. Funny, things just happened to work out. Unbelievable!

Again, a funny thing worked out. I was invited to accompany fellow faculty members and families on a day of cruising aboard a diesel powered Arabian dhow in the Arabian (Persian) Gulf. What started out as a harmless, innocent cruise ended with a boat load of deathly sick passengers who were very lucky to survive. The plan was to cruise to Kubr, a small island off the Kuwaiti coast, where we could rest, explore and just enjoy the company.

We never got there; the wind came up and the decision was made to change course by about 170 degrees and head to Failaka, a much larger island with a sheltered harbor. Making the 'u' turn was terrifying; the seas, abeam to starboard, were now about 8 feet and passengers, including children, just

hung on and prayed. Upon reaching port the passengers decided to rest on deck while the captain and crew slept in the engine room. Something must not have felt right because I awoke to see the harbor 'back there', and 8 footers 'out there.' It turned out that another dhow captain (most were Iranians) did not like the idea that our dhow was close to his; he undid our lines while we rested and cast us off into the tidal currents. I alerted the sleeping captain and he maneuvered us back to where we were. This was all new to us. Funny, things just happened to work out. Our tour of Failaka proved extremely interesting, with a story that I shall relate at a later time.

At approximately 1600 the crew and passengers headed for home, Ras al Ardh, about 12 nautical miles to the west, right through a major shipping lane. With a fog showing signs of trouble I made my way to the wheelhouse, discovering the compass rose was corroded fast and totally useless. Simultaneously, I glanced out the starboard porthole and saw a huge freighter bearing down on us and the relative bearing was not changing. Collision course!

I asked the captain if he saw the oncoming vessel. He said nothing leaving me to think he did not understand much English. The freighter let loose with the horn. I called for an interpreter which did not help at all. The captain steered straight ahead. I convinced the interpreter he might soon be dead if the fellow at the wheel didn't turn and go around in back of (astern of) the oncoming freighter. He and I wrestled the wheel away from the poor fellow, turned to starboard and proceeded around, astern of the ship. The wake was exciting. There were two other gentlemen who knew what was happening, both were seagoing Scots and were caring for very seasick passengers. The unqualified captain noted his ability to sort things out, saving our vessel and everyone on board. I never argued. My spouse, two progeny and I, and everyone else were alive. I just happened to be in the wheelhouse at the right time. Wow!

I'll relate this story to Horatio when he returns to *Waldhaus* Ash. Actually, he might have heard it ten or twenty times before. I don't think any of you are familiar with it.

Incidentally, there were neither lifelines nor life vests on board the dhow. Had I realized it, right on, the Ash family would have turned down the invitation. Close call it was. Kuwait truly needed a Power Squadron to educate the public boaters and that's another story I'll tell at a later date. Masalama!

Activities


- One-day "inside" cruise to Cape Lookout (shallowest anticipated water, 3 ft.)

- Depart mid-afternoon and consider ice cream (wine?) at the Beaufort dock!

Launch Options – Wildlife Ramps

- Join the *LuSea* at the Oriental Wildlife Ramp 0900.
- Radio Island, Morehead City
- Town Creek, Beaufort
- Boats will rendezvous at the **Beaufort City Docks**, **1030**. Hail the "Cape Lookout Adventurers" on Channel 16, then switch to 71.

This is a very fun day! Boats will head towards the Beaufort inlet, follow Shackelford Island, cut across to Harkers Island and follow the aids to navigation to Cape Lookout. We will be going through some shallow waters, so prudent mariners will stay in the channel and consider carrying a push pole or poling oar due to ever-changing shoals. Include e-mail, cell number and boat description so we can be on the lookout for you. The cruise is subject to weather cancellation, so check e-mails by Monday morning 0800. See you on the water!

♣ Each year, the timing of the Solstice depends on when the sun reaches its farthest point north of the equator. This occurs annually on June 20 or June 21 in North America, depending on your time zone. The word Solstice is from the Latin solstitium, from sol (sun) and stitium (to stop), reflecting the fact that the sun appears to stop at this moment (and again at the winter solstice).
