

She was preceded in death by her parents, Hannah and Samuel Schneider, and by her brother, Mark.

Sue is survived by Edward W. Gagnon, her loving husband of 44 years.

Born in Brookline, Massachusetts on February 23, 1946, Sue was a graduate of Brookline High School Class of 1963 and Lesley College. She and Ed were long-time residents of Needham, Massachusetts. In her professional life, Susan was a Technical Consultant and Corporate Trainer with Polaroid Corporation – a career that spanned more than 30 years. Prior to that, Sue was a Research Fellow at Boston's Childrens' Hospital.

Outside of work, Sue led a full life. She enjoyed going to the theater and concerts of all sorts, from Jimmy Buffett to the symphony. She and Ed also loved to travel. Memorable trips include their windjammer cruise through the Panama Canal, a cruise in Alaska, and, early in their marriage, an eight-week, cross country camping trip. And of course, there was Sue's great love of dogs, especially Airedales.

While living in Massachusetts, Sue worked with the Needham Community Theatre, and was a Red Cross volunteer . Sue was a member and Past Commander of the Great Blue Hill Power Squadron. Sue and Ed were known for hosting an annual Fourth of July breakfast. This became a real Needham tradition, attended by hundreds each year. Susan also started another holiday tradition in Needham. Every Halloween, Sue would set up a photo studio in their front hall and give each Trickor-Treater a Polaroid instant photo instead of a candy treat.

Once Sue and Ed settled in Fairfield Harbour in 2013, Sue was just as busy. Here, she became involved in the Cape Lookout Sail and Power Squadron. She was active in the Fairfield Harbour Newcomers Club, the Fairfield Harbour Garden Club and the Fairfield Harbour Yacht Club. In addition, she enjoyed writing articles for the Fairfield Harbour Beacon and was a founding member of the Ladybirds luncheon club of Birdland, Fairfield Harbour. She was also a volunteer for the annual MS Bike-a-Thon, and the local NPR station.

Susan will be remembered for her kind and loving heart, sense of humor, and love of life. As one of her dear friends said so beautifully, "Her light will continue to shine bright in the memories of all whose lives she touched. We will miss our Sweet Susan tremendously."

Burial was in Highland Cemetery, Dover, Massachusetts. A memorial service and celebration of Sue's life was held on Saturday, January 6th, 2018 from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Fairfield Harbour Community Center.

The year 2018 brought with it my promise to review my old notes from the N Course. Twenty years have elapsed since the famous four completed the rigors of the USPS graduate offering and hats off to P/R/Cdr Bill Reasons who led us through very tough times. Ah, here he comes in a sparkling new uniform for 2018. "Horatio, I have a story which I read on my computer about a ship which found itself in a very interesting situation. The story is not original with me. How do you like this one?"

SS Warrimoo A FASCINATING SHORT SEA STORY

The passenger steamer SS Warrimoo was quietly knifing its way through the waters of the mid-Pacific on its way from Vancouver to Australia. The navigator had just finished working out a star fix and brought the master, Captain John Phillips, the result. The Warrimoo's position was LAT 0° 31' N and LON 179 30' W. The date was 31 December 1899

"Know what this means?" First Mate Payton broke in, "We're only a few miles from the intersection of the Equator and the International Date Line".

Captain Phillips was prankish enough to take full advantage of the opportunity for achieving the navigational freak of a lifetime. He called his navigators to the bridge to check & double check the ships position. He changed course slightly so as to bear directly on his mark. Then he adjusted the engine speed. The calm weather & clear night worked in his favor.



At midnight the SS Warrimoo lay on the Equator at exactly the point where it crossed the International Date Line!

The consequences of this bizarre position were many:

The forward part (bow) of the ship was in the Southern Hemisphere & in the middle of summer.

The rear (stern) was in the Northern Hemisphere & in the middle of winter.

The date in the aft part of the ship was 31 December 1899.

In the bow (forward) part it was 1 January 1900.

This ship was therefore not only in:

Two different days,

Two different months,

Two different years,

Two different seasons

But in two different centuries – all at the same time.


