Autobiography Robert G Stammerjohn 8 October 2019

It is difficult, at best, to capsulize ninety two years of life in a single page, so I will dwell primarily on my activities after I retired from 30 years in the Navy as a carrier pilot. My last assignments were at the Pentagon and the Joint Communication Center in Washington D.C.

At this point I was living near Alexandria VA with wife Joan and six children. My part-time activity was as a small business accountant and tennis as a hobby. In 1990 we moved to St. Mary's County, Maryland now with the children moving on and leaving us an empty nest.

In 1993 I joined the Patuxent River Sail and Power Squadron for gaining more information about sailing and boating safety. Other activities include a post as County Election Judge, accounting for Three Oaks, a homeless center for men, and an AARP Income Tax Preparer.

During the following years with the squadron I served on the Bridge for seven years as Secretary, Treasurer and Education Officer (3 years). Also served as the Advanced Navigation Course Chairman for District 5. Over the years I have instructed nearly every course in the grade and supplementary offerings. I attained the grade of Senior Navigator in

2001 and helped about 12 members achieve the grade of Navigator including one young lady. Navigation is my hobby an inspiration and necessity as a Navy Pilot. For these efforts gracious members of the squadron nominated me for the Charles F. Chapman Award which I received at the National Convention in 2008.

My boating experience started with my wife who became joint owner of a sail boat with a mutual friend who later became ill and I paid off his part of the boat loan. The boat, a 38-foot Catalina sloop, occupied the dock at our new property at St. Mary's City, MD on Inigoes Creek with access to the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay. Lots of good water for sailing.

Over the last 25 years I have sailed the Chesapeake with its many rivers, creeks and coves. A good portion was single handling. However aging finally convinced me that single handling was no longer a safe option. We gave our boat to our two sons and its now located at Marathon Fla. The boys are super mechanics

and knowledgeable sailors. It could not be in better hands. Because of their experience and knowledge the boat did not suffer any damage during the 2018 hurricane. So now I am without any floating objects (no liquid assets).

My interest in joining your squadron (Club) is to offer my experience as an instructor for the advanced grade courses, JN and N. I am available with sextant and would prefer at least 3 students but I can accommodate a single enthusiastic member.
