Looking ahead to 2020, at our annual meeting on 20 January 2020, Cape Lookout Sail & Power Squadron will celebrate our 60th anniversary. Eleven men were instrumental in forming the Squadron on January 16, 1960. Cape Lookout was sponsored by the Cape Fear Power Squadron. Our Squadron pennant was designed by one of the original eleven men, W.E. Larson. The alternate blue and white stripes in our pennant are taken from the USPS Ensign. The black diamond is the symbol for Cape Lookout Lighthouse, from which we derive our name. The star represents the North Star, which seamen have used for centuries to steer a straight course by. The red surrounding the star represents courage to always do the right thing. The white field around the black diamond stands for

honor. The eleven color variations in the pennant represent the eleven men in the original group who founded Cape Lookout Power Squadron. In 1998, approval was granted by National to change our name to Cape Lookout Sail and Power Squadron. During the past two years with the approval of the Executive Committee and recommendation from National, we have been transitioning to America's Boating Club® New Bern, Cape Lookout Sail & Power Squadron, District 27.

District 27 will be hosting a winter training session from 0830 to 1430 on 11 January 2020 at the Resurrection Lutheran Church School in Cary, NC. Sessions will include:
Presentations, Wow!, Commanders, Executive officers, Administrative officers, Educational officers, Coop-Charting-Nautical and Geodetic, Secretaries, Treasurers, Marketing your Squadron; Learn, Engage, Connect with Social Media. Vessel Safety Check program



The season for VSE has closed for this year in so far as reporting our vessel examinations are concerned. The new stickers should be available soon after the first of the year, so please keep that in mind and let one of our examiners know when you would like to have your vessel checked.

For 2019, our examiners set a new record for our squadron by completing 463 vessel safety checks. That is 22 more than we did last year and something the squadron should be proud of, especially considering we only have 8 certified examiners. It is my understanding that the Cape Fear Squadron beat us out for having the most examinations completed by just a few, and they have 25 examiners. We would like to have more examiners,

not to beat Cape Fear, but to provide better safety service to our boating community.

Being an examiner does not take much time, and I personally enjoy going aboard boats I have never seen before and talking with the skippers. Always hear some interesting sea stories. If you have an interest in becoming a Vessel Safety Examiner, let me know and we will arrange for a training session. It only takes a day, and we have an open book exam.






Hats and Visors are ONLY \$10.


