Take a boating safety course. 5. Make sure your boat is prepared. 6. Be sure to know your boat's capacity. 7. Check the weather, including the water temperature. 8. Dress properly. 9. Always file a float plan. 10. Always follow navigation rules. 11. Don't drink while you boat. 12. Beware of carbon monoxide poisoning. 13. Keep in touch.”
