Vessel Safety Check program



I am honored to assume the chair of the VSE Committee from Larry Lovvorn although I know I have big shoes to fill. Larry has done an outstanding job of leading our Vessel Examiners for the past several years. For 2018, CLSPS set a squadron record for the number of Vessel Exams completed at 441. With just a couple of months left for this season, we have surpassed last year with a count of 452 to date. Larry gets credit for this year as well.

I fully expect our count to exceed 460 before year's end. All of our examiners, with one exception have completed enough inspections to remain certified for another year. If you haven't had your vessel safety check for this year, it certainly isn't too late, and you help the squadron even if your vessel doesn't pass. The purpose of the VSE program is to let skippers know if their vessel has the necessary safety equipment aboard that meets USCG requirements. If a vessel does not pass, then the skipper knows exactly what needs to be done to have the proper safety equipment aboard, and this is something the skipper did not know prior to the inspection. When a vessel does not pass, that information is not reported to any other agency, including USPS district or national. However, the inspection still counts towards the VSE total for the year, and of course for the squadron.

So please help the squadron out by having your vessel checked before year's end, and make sure the agency that does find your vessel deficient is NOT the USCG or NC Wildlife Resources Commission agents.
