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
Vessel Safety Examinations are under full swing. As of this writing, our examiners have completed 105 vessel safety checks. Interestingly enough, not one was for a member of Cape Lookout Sail and Power Squadron. I wonder what kind of message this sends?

In May, we will be doing the VSEs at the camps across the river so our count will go up considerably. I realize a number of our members no longer have boats, but those of you who do really should have a free Vessel Safety Examination.

A safety check only takes about 15 minutes and assures YOU that you have everything you need as far as safety equipment and legal documentation aboard to have a safe season on the water. All it takes is a call to one of our Vessel Safety Examiners and we will

take care of you whether your vessel is in a marina, on a trailer in your driveway, or wherever it might be.

Any vessel not used for commercial purposes can be checked by our examiners. That includes power boats, sailboats, tenders i.e. dingys, canoes, kayaks, and paddle boards. Paddle craft checks takes about 5 minutes.

The 120°F temperatures of Kuwait must have liquefied my brain because I decided to remain firm and called my friend and repeated my answer of, "No." Then I called my university back home in the States and said I'd be back for the fall semester. After two days the phone rang and it was my lawyer friend. He asked me if I understood the salary he had
